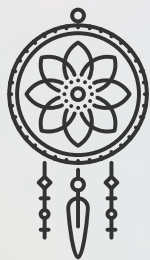

Inspiring Possibilities: Providing students opportunities and experiences such as career exploration ideas, trade shows, workshops and guest speakers all help promote new ways of thinking and doing. It is through exploring new ideas, building connections, and applying what they learn in school that learning becomes relevant. Learning through many different contexts will contribute to each student's writing and overall understanding of the world, how it works, and where they fit in.

Parents and School Council

Our School Council provides ongoing feedback through School Council meetings, conversations with our two Schultz, and parent opinions are highlighted in school and government surveys. We have a wonderful school where our parents help in providing the most amazing Mom's hot lunches, contributing to class projects, joining classes as field trip supervisors, and working with the school in overcoming unforeseen obstacles. We are truly a community school that pulls together to get things done.

Teachers

Our professional teaching team are engaged in our monthly staff meetings where they explore the best teaching and learning methods that engage English Language Learners explore their world. All of our teachers have input into the school goals and we leverage teacher expertise in developing and implementing options classes for our grade 6 to 9 students.

Our teachers are engaging in professional development that support new initiatives and our student support meetings ensure that students are best supported through programming and structure inside the classroom and out.

Support Staff

Our support staff are engaged in school functions, both at school and community-sponsored events held in the community. Our support staff set up and run some awesome activities such as our annual book fair, and all support staff contribute to new policies and/or practices to ensure that students are safe, structured, and supported at our school.

Students

Our Student Ambassador club has had a significant impact on the student activities offered at our school over the last 3 years. From the implementation of our options courses such as soap and candle making, painting, baking and Outdoor education to the monthly theme based activities that our students organize, and implement help build community across grades and within the school.

Community Groups

Building relationships with businesses and parents within the community, we want to thank Big Marble for teaching us about the importance of farming and growing our own food in Alberta, the Interpretative Center for Police Point Park that helps our students connect to the land and the importance that land plays in our lives.

We have also developed a partnership with Alberta Health Services as well as the University of Alberta and their nursing program where soon to be nurses build relationships with our Mennonite students. Our newest partnership is with Prairie Gleaners, an NGO that provides food for those who need it across Canada and throughout the world.

Students and PRPS staff are strengthened by acts of consequential service to others, actively ensure all belong, and participate and celebrate their rural communities.

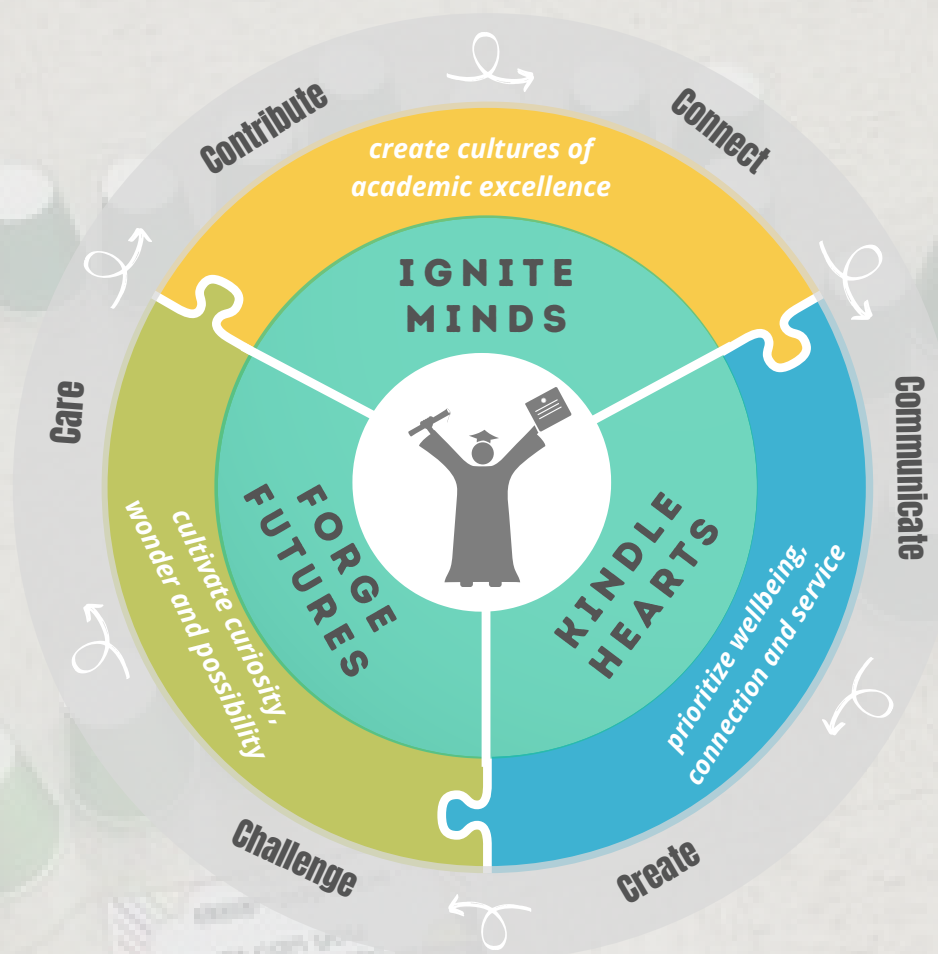
Challenge

PRPS GOAL 1: IGNITE MINDS

Background: We will ignite minds by creating cultures of academic excellence

SCHOOL BASED STRATEGIES

In the early elementary grades we have a very robust literacy program that integrates phonics and phonemic awareness using the University of Florida Literacy Institute (UFLI) program to ensure that students have a solid foundation in reading and writing.

Through hands-on learning, students are able to showcase their understanding of the concepts taught. Whether this be through hands-on Science experiments, building dioramas that depict an important scene in a book, or by building planter boxes in Math that connect our Mennonite students with the land, students gain a better understanding of the application of learning as it pertains to the real world.

SCHOOL BASED PERFORMANCE MEASURES

The MAP assessment to test literacy comprehension as well as the Mipi test for numeracy are both implemented in September and again in June. This allows teachers to monitor student growth and identify concepts that specific students are struggling with to ensure that these gaps are filled before moving on to the next grade.

We use the results from grade 6 and 9 PATs as well as feedback from our Annual Assurance survey to identify and target areas for improvement as well as identify areas where we are excelling.

PRPS GOAL 2: KINDLE HEARTS

Background: We will kindle hearts by prioritizing wellbeing, belonging and service.

SCHOOL BASED STRATEGIES

Having a sense of belonging that connects us to our community, our school, and the people who work and learn at the school are all key factors that contribute to the wellbeing and belonging of each student and staff member. In our support of the Mennonite community, we have Mom's monthly hot lunches, Plautdietsch in German opening and German catechism classes, and student involvement through our Student Ambassador club in running the school's canteen and in school activities to celebrate festivals and holidays throughout the year.

We support the national initiative of incorporating activities and guest speakers, such as Whitebear Creations, to help facilitate reconciliation and promote awareness of the positive contributions Indigenous people have had on society.

At the school level, in conjunction with the help from Alberta Health Services, we participate in promoting and supporting anti-bullying awareness, engaging students in becoming leaders in our Student Ambassador club, and by giving back to the community by bringing everyone together for special events such as: our annual meet the teacher pancake breakfast, Student led conferences, school concerts, whole school field trips, and community bbqs.

SCHOOL BASED PERFORMANCE MEASURES

The performance measures for Kindle Hearts will be measured in the active participation and engagement of students, parents, and staff in activities hosted by/through the school. The more events, and the larger the turn out ensures that people feel connected to their community, to the school, and to each other. This will be seen in events hosted by the school as well as those developed and implemented by our Student Ambassador club.

PRPS GOAL 3: FORGE FUTURES

Background: Futures will be forged by cultivating wonder and possibilities.

SCHOOL BASED STRATEGIES

Our Student Ambassador club has been instrumental in providing a student voice at Prairie Mennonite. The Student Ambassador club organizes activities at the school that align with student interest, school spirit, and community functions. Activities such as reading buddies, student lead holiday crafts and running the school canteen ensure that students are engaged and are having fun at school. The Student Ambassador club, through its organization, implementation, and running of events, is building tomorrow's leaders.

Our staff taps into the Prairie Rose Possibilities fund to organize field trips that expose our students to activities in the community that align with the curricula they teach. By exposing students to content-specific activities, students can draw on their own personal experiences to better understand the concepts being taught in class.

We also run a monthly competition where students are part of one of four houses. These houses compete in academics, attendance, and in being model citizens. At the end of each month, the house with the most points wins a special treat.

SCHOOL BASED PERFORMANCE MEASURES

The Student Ambassador club, school activities, and community field trips in conjunction with our Options classes integrate vocational skills with school academics so students develop of a greater understanding of how the world works and where we fit in.

SCHOOL BASED STRATEGIES

Prairie Mennonite has built a close relationship with Whitebear Creations and Elder Brenda Lee, who continues to support our students and staff in learning about Indigenous knowledge, perspectives, and the importance of connecting with the land.

We continue to build a greater appreciation for Indigenous people as Brenda explains the why behind an activity or service the importance it has had in the ways Indigenous people do things or the way they believe. By braiding the seven Grandfather teachings of Love, Respect, Bravery, Truth, Honesty, Humility & Wisdom into our school assemblies and culture, students are on the path to growing into good global citizens.

We look forward to Brenda's continued work as we take our next steps and implement an Indigenous garden as well as continue to explore Indigenous knowledge through stories and storytelling, a new initiative that is currently being developed between the school and Whitebear Creations.

Supporting English as a Second Language Learners



SCHOOL BASED STRATEGIES

All the students at Prairie Mennonite are English Language Learners as they speak Plautdietsch (Low German) at home and learn in English while at school. Learning to communicate and express your ideas in two languages is complex, and at Prairie Mennonite, we facilitate the language acquisition of both languages. Plautdietsch is used as an immersive experience in our German opening and German catechism classes, while English is used in all other courses and on the playgrounds during breaks.

Our teachers have a lot of experience and expertise at structuring non-native English speakers in becoming successful at school. The use of hands-on learning activities, benchmarks to find appropriate reading content, word walls and posters to help with difficult concepts, ongoing interventions when needed, and having a German translator in elementary core classes to translate when students don't understand are some of the techniques we use to ensure that all of our students understand and are supported in their learning.

Combining Mennonite language and culture with school academics ensures that our students have the skills they need to succeed at school, at home, and later when they enter the workforce.

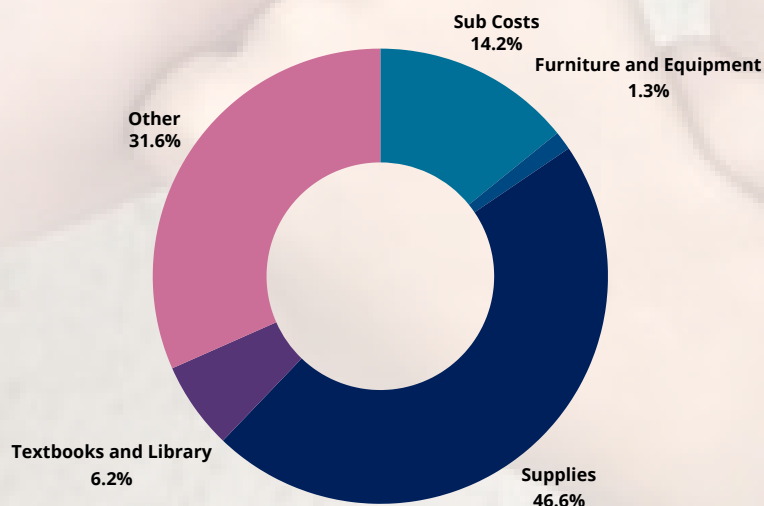
2023-2024 Budget Summary
